This is good to see direct organisation with specific codes, with all reporting and with oversight of the Club Executive Committee.

Without our playing pitches, Round Towers Lusk would not be fielding the players who each week want to play with their heart and soul to play at the best they can at every game. Thank you to Kevin O'Neill and his team for marking out the pitches and keeping the grass and surrounds in excellent condition. Kevin is stepping down from the tractor after many a year. Our gratitude for his dedication to maintaining our grass can not be truly expressed and for so many years helping in our Club, thank you.

Our post games chats, craic agus ceol along with our tea, coffee and mi-wadi would not be possible without the bar staff. Thanks to those behind the bar.

## Gaelic Games (in no particular order)

#### Adult Hurling

2024 was a year of consolidation and building for the future of Adult Hurling. Our Junior team maintained their league and championship status under the steady stewardship of Naoise MacFheorais, Graham Barrett, Mark Condron and Sean McGarry. We had some good performances and brought in a number of younger players. Our Minors were amalgamated with Naomh Maur as Ros Lucsa.

We reached the county quarter-finals after good victories over Erins Isle and Thomas Davis. Unfortunately, with dreadful conditions, this quarter final game v Naomh Barrog was lost. We are hugely proud of Darragh Kilduff and Evan Ferguson, two whom have represented County and Club this year at Minor. Many thanks to John McKenna, Neason Farry, Lusk and Pat Codd for their support. In 2024, an Adult Hurling Committee was formed to support and grow Adult Hurling and reach their true potential.

#### Handball

The first steps to re-establish a handball club in Lusk began in April 2022 with a social media celebration of the handball alley built by local people, including Thomas Ashe, between 1913-1914 and an open call to all those interested in supporting this project to join a RTL Handball Committee. Contact was established with the GAA Handball Association at the same time and we are thankful for the advice, resources and support received since that initial contact. Recognition and awareness of our handball heritage was further enhanced in August 2023 when we came together, with the support of the Adult Mens Football Committee, to celebrate our handball heritage with former mentors and players. On the evening John and Pat Kelly presented the club with a framed collage of photos from the 80's and a framed history of the old handball alley.

The promotion of handball took a significant step forward in autumn 2024 when we instigated a collaboration with Lusk Community College in the context of the GAA Future Leaders programme. The Handball Association provided a day of first-class training to circa 141 Transition Year students in the College in October 2024. Those 141 students have since been busy completing a training session and classroom session about handball to all 1st and 2nd year classes in the school (420 students in total). We are extremely grateful to TY teachers Hannah Jones and Cian Haddock, TY coordinator Cathy Peoples and Conor McElduff, Handball Regional Development Officer, for their support in bringing handball to a new generation of Lusk children.

Looking forward to 2025, we plan to build on the work completed to date and look forward to expanding the capacities of our handball committee. Our primary ambition will be to run a pilot project in the club for juvenile players in the new year.

# Ladies Section

2024 was another successful year for ladies games at the club with strong membership number across both Adult and Juveniles. Our juvenile teams continue to perform brilliantly on field, with success in both league and championship/cup competitions. The continued growth in the number of girls participating at nursery and the addition of an under 8s squad this year bodes well for the future.

Of particular note is our ladies minor team who with the support of the Under 15 and Under 14 girls won both the Camogie and Football Championships. With the majority of the 21 members of the squad in their first year at minor and the continued support of the teams below, we look forward to another successful year ahead.

For the adults ladies football squad the appointment of a new management team breathe new life into the squad. Particular mention to Noel Shields who took on the role of head coach. With up to 30 ladies regularly attending sessions over a long season, contributing to a very successful year with the ladies winning the Division 5 Cup and Go Ahead Junior C Shield, while narrowly missing out on the league title. The ladies won promotion and are looking forward to division 4 in 2025.

With strong numbers and the support of the minors the ladies committee are intent on establishing a ladies 2<sup>nd</sup> team to participate in 2025, and a recruitment process for a 2<sup>nd</sup> team manager and new first team coach having commenced. We also plan to establish an adult ladies camogie team for Championship in 2025.

Our under 15 girls despite challenging numbers had another successful year, the girls developed massively and were competitive in very challenging games in both league and championship. The grit and determination from a small group of committed players has ensured they retained Division 4 status in football.

The under 15 management and parents stepped up at short notice for a tremendous exhibition of Camogie at the club as they hosted the Division 2 Féile 2024 Group A and both Semi-Finals. Although the girls where unlucky not to progress it was an great day for the team and the club.

The under 14 girls had a slow start to the year, finishing mid table in Football League and struggling in Camogie, the second half of the year proving far more successful as the team went unbeaten to top their group and progress with home advantage to the Camogie Semi-final. The team also progressed to the Football Championship final running out winners in a hard fought match on home soil.

The club continues to be well represented at inter-county level, with Lile Tully being selected to represent the club at minor level for Dublin. The development of Camogie at the club is very evident with three players regularly togging out for the Dublin Under 15 Development Panel and two more at Under 14 Level. In 2025 the club will be represented at Under 16, Under 15 and Under 14 in Camogie Development Panels. The future of Camogie at the club looks bright.

The growth of ladies games at the club has been phenomenal over the past few years and with numbers swelling at younger age groups there is a lot to look forward to as we move into 2025. We would like to extend our thanks to Noel Shields, Rod Mangan and Sandra Mangan for the contributions to the section over the last few years after they confirmed they will be stepping down from the Adult Ladies and Under 15 management teams respectively.

#### Adult Men's Football

## 2024 Season

It was a tough season due to various mitigating factors which resulted in relegation from AFL1 and the Senior 2 championship.

The second team retained AFL6 and Junior 2 All County status.

## Juvenile Nursery / CCC1 / CCC2

2024 has been a very progressive year for the Juvenile Section, both on and off the pitch. A new Juvenile structure and committee was introduced for 2024 with a focus on attracting more boys and girls to play our sports and ensuring the children of Lusk experience the joy of playing football, hurling and camogie. A special thanks to all of the parents and guardians who arrange travel to and from training and matches and are always willing to support the Club in many ways including fundraising and refreshments for blitzes, Feile etc.

## Towers Óga

Our nursery section was renamed Towers Óga as part of a relaunch in April this year. This included the introduction of the Towers Tiger who is already an infamous member of the Club! The numbers attending each Saturday continue to grow and through our ongoing fundraising efforts we were able to provide a Round Towers Lusk training top, shorts and socks to every girl and boy during the period of our relaunch. For the first time, we hosted a joint session with our friends from Lusk United FC and plan a follow up session in the New Year. New Towers Óga signage was installed at Rush and Lusk train station (with the support of Neary Motors), at Thomas Ashe Park and a portable sign for use at various locations around the village. Many thanks to Claire Myers, Kevin Niall and Gerry Seaver for a fantastic year of Towers Oga. Thanks also to our team of juvenile and adult coaches who add so much to the children's enjoyment every Saturday. A special thanks to Noel Shields for all his help, not just with Towers Óga, but with coaching and developing many of our juvenile girls and boys teams.

### Club Camps

Our Games Promotion Officer (GPO), Gerry Seaver continues to work tirelessly to promote the playing of our games through his work at Towers Oga, club camps and our local primary and secondary schools. Our Easter camp had 150

attendees, Cul Camps had 180, our Club Camp 165 and our Advanced Camp 53. In total 62 coaches and helpers made each camp a fun, memorable and development experience for all involved and we appreciate the time and enthusiasm everyone gives to their role. Our Advanced Camp included a number of County players as guest coaches including Sean Bugler, Daniel St Ledger, Matthew Costello, Paddy Small, Laura Carolan, Alan O'Neill, Paddy Doyle and Brian Lennon.

#### Schools

As well as his regular attendance in schools to run training and movement sessions, Gerry also organised a number of local and inter-school blitzes. In May, more than 350 pupils from Lusk primary schools attended blitzes at Thomas Ashe Park. The annual Martin Finnegan football tournament included 22 girls and boys teams from schools across North Dublin. A schools hurling tournament was introduced this year with 4 schools participating in the Thomas Ashe tournament for the first time. The Sam Maguire trophy visited the local schools this year – you are welcome back soon Sam! Many thanks to the Principals and Teachers of all the schools in the parish for your support of Gaelic Games this year including the distribution of more than 1,000 leaflets to pupils and parents.

### **All Stars**

Our All Stars programme continues to go from strength to strength and celebrated their first year as a team in September this year. This very important initiative means children with additional needs can learn ball skills, exercise and have fun and enjoyment in a safe environment. Currently 20 children and their families attend each Friday and we would like to thank DryMyHome.ie for sponsoring jerseys for our All Stars. We also received two grants from Fingal County Council which; along with support from the Club, the girls U15 Feile team and Lusk National School, means we can provide equipment and facilities to run our sessions each Friday. Many thanks to Claire Myers, Naoise McFheorais, Robert Naughton and Joe for your time and attention to the All Stars.

### **CCC1 & CCC2 Girls and Boys**

We fielded 16 girls and boys teams from U8 to U16 in 2024. This meant a total more than 360 girls and boys played the sports of football, camogie and hurling in the Round Towers Lusk colours this year. We are very proud of each and every player in the Juvenile Section and we hope that every player is proud of what they have achieved this year. While we celebrate success and silverware, we equally celebrate the fact that our players continue to participate and work hard to be better tomorrow than they were yesterday. # • Fingal County Council

#### Facilities and Pitches

There is massive commitment within the club in terms of the maintenance and improvement of our facilities and pitches. We are all aware and very thankful of the many volunteers who give up their time and energy to develop and improve our pitches and facilities. The work is so extensive and varied that it is close to impossible to keep track of all the people involved. I would like to sincerely thank the team of who line our pitches and maintain the grounds to such good condition, ensuring that our teams have such fine playing facilities. With that in mind, I would like to pay special tribute to the names of those members and volunteers who do not appear in this report.

TAP1 continues to provide an exceptional playing surface when the weather is dry. There is a discussion on how TAP1 can be used and developed for the future. This is part of our development on development.

Improvements in the playing surface of TAP2 can be attributed to top-dressing with sand, fertiliser and shock-waving of the pitch that have taken place this year, at a not so insignificant cost of circa €10,000 this year alone. I would like

to thank our mentors and players for their cooperation in ensuring that it is not overused or used in unsuitable conditions as this top dressing and fertilizer needs time for the grass to strengthen roots and to establish the playing surface long term.

I would like to mention Kevin O'Neill and Neil Hanlon for their crucial role in these improvements and excellent grass facilities at Páirc Thomáis Ághais.

In 2023 development discussions were held on November 7<sup>th</sup> and November 25<sup>th</sup>, with the help of Leinster Council and facilitator Clare O'Sullivan. This year we have development plans

Sincere thanks to the Gym team under Rob Naughton, for their work in development of our club gym has shown great progression with the squads S&C. This is a fantastic facility and is been utilised by our squads in the evenings and in the mornings by Aaron Howley and his MoveStrong business.

While our current grant supports Floodlighting for the training area and TAP2. A ball wall, in line with our development plan is needed and can be used across both codes. Once ratified on it's location the planning process can begin and a project of this scale need Capital grant funding.

We also need to recognise that there are limits as to what a volunteer or a group of volunteers can be expected to take on. Looking at the 2025 Executive with many positions vacant, this is a worrying trend for our Club.

Our achievements and progress as a club have been made possible thanks to the collective work of generations of members and volunteers. This year like last, I firmly believe in the power of the collective and draw inspiration from the people who built this club and other GAA clubs throughout the country.

On behalf of the Executive, I'd like to express my and all involved the utmost gratitude to all and their families for the often selfless work contributing to our Club. As noted in 2023, this year is my final as Club Secretary. I'd like to wish Ciarán all the best in the years ahead.

I would like us all to take a moment to pause and reflect on those whom we've lost since the last report by An Rúnai. Our thoughts are with you and your familes during this time of grieving, reflection and memories. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a (h)anam.
